
Sports Reportby Marc Fenn, Sports Director

The National Work Queue: What is it, and how does it affect you and your claims?

When it comes to filing claims, most Veterans think that claims go right to their state's regional office, and it stays there until completed. In the past, this was indeed the case.

However, as of spring of 2016, this is no longer case due to the National Work Queue, or NWQ for short being implemented. Unless a Veteran works directly for the VA benefits side of the house, the claim can be worked anywhere in the Unites States, as well as regional offices outside of the United States to include Manila, Philippines, for example.

Think of it like this: Your claim is worked by a service officer or accredited secretary, which is then submitted to Janesville, WI to be input into the NWQ system. Your claim is then cested into what is known as the "portal". From that point, the claim can be worked anywhere as previously mentioned. This includes military sexual trauma claims (MST) and even amyotrophic lateral sclerosis claims (ALS), which used to stay on the station of jurisdiction, which for Nevada, would be Reno. I have seen claims transfer stations as much as three to four times in a single day!

How can this possibly be tracked, and how does your claim keep from falling into the proverbial "cracks"? For your claim to be a success, this take due diligence from the service officer to monitor the claims regularly, if not daily. My office spends multiple hours a day correcting poor rating decisions, ensuring Veterans are notified of their exams, making sure paperwork is processed that is needed, and constantly following up with regional offices to make sure our Veterans claims are accurately rated in a timely manner.

How this NWQ affects our Veterans is not only in that regard, but also in the fact this takes time from being able to communicate with our Veterans immediately. We definitely care about our Veterans, and try to respond as much as possible in the most timely and efficient manner.

We thank our Veterans for continuing to have patience with us while trying to find resolution in a system that is within its first year of active processing. There is no finite timeline which the claims are processed at this point – some claims can go as fast as a month or two, some take four to six months. It's a battle of patience for not only the service officer, but our Veterans. Always know we will do our best to work with each and every one of our Veterans in the most timely, proactive, and professional way possible.



It's once again time to start thinking about elections. We are approaching the time for electing a new President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and five (5) members of the Board of Directors for our chapter.

Please get involved and run for office. If you would like to run, please submit your biography to our office, along with a letter of intent advising us of which position you are interested in running for. We will be publishing biographies of all members interested in running for office in our October/November newsletter. Bio's will be due **no later than** September 1, 2017. Ballots will be sent out in December and due back to our office **no later than** January 10th, 2018.

Advocacy/Legislative News

Congress Passes Choice Program Extension

With the Choice program set to expire on August 7, 2017, Congress recently passed a law eliminating the mandatory expiration date for the program, allowing it to continue to deliver health care services to veterans in the community and use up the remaining funds in the program. Without the extension, the projected remaining funds would be returned to the Treasury. This extension now provides extra time for Congress to address the shortfalls of the current program and move toward a wider and more permanent health care reform in VA. The bill now awaits the President's signature.

The "Social Security 2100 Act" Reintroduced

On April 5, 2017, PVA Senior Associate Advocacy Director Susan Prokop joined Members of Congress, disability advocates and representatives of the aging community at a Capitol Hill roll out of H.R. 1920, the "Social Security 2100 Act," introduced by Rep. John Larson (D-CT). Rep. Larson is Ranking Minority Member on the House Ways and Means Social Security Subcommittee. Citing polling data that shows 72 percent of Americans believe that Social Security benefits should be increased, not cut, Rep. Larson described provisions in his bill favored by 7 out of 10 Americans. Among those provisions are:

Adoption of the CPI-E for inflation increases: Using the CPI-E for the annual Social Security cost of living adjustment (COLA) would better reflect the costs incurred by seniors and people with disabilities who spend a greater portion of their income on health care, utilities and other necessities.

- ♦ **Protections for low income workers:** To ensure that low income working people who paid into the system over a lifetime don't retire into poverty, the bill establishes a new minimum benefit set at 25 percent above the poverty line.
- ♦ Adjustments in the payroll tax wage base to help finance the system: Presently, payroll taxes are not collected on annual wages over \$127,000. H.R. 1902 would apply the payroll tax to wages above \$400,000 which would affect the top 0.4 percent of wage earners.
- ♦ A gradual increase over 20 years in the payroll contribution rate to keep the system sol vent: Beginning in 2018, FICA taxes would rise 0.05 percent annually so that workers and employers would pay an additional 1.2 percent by 2041. For the average worker this would mean paying an additional 50 cents per week to ensure the system's longevity.

In addition, HR 1902 would provide a modest increase in benefits for all beneficiaries equivalent to 2 percent of the average benefit, cut taxes for upper income beneficiaries by raising the thresholds at which benefits are taxed to \$50,000 for individuals and \$100,000 for couples and combine the old age and survivors and disability insurance trust funds to foreclose future arguments over the disability insurance program by eliminating the artificial separation of the trust funds.

PVA supports H.R. 1902 because of its more realistic cost-of-living-adjustment for beneficiaries, enhanced protections for low income workers, and long overdue adjustments in the financing mechanisms for the system. Indeed, an independent analysis by the Social Security Administration's Chief Actuary indicates that this legislation will extend the financial health of the system beyond the next 75 years. PVA believes this legislation demonstrates that preserving and strengthening Social Security can be done without causing harm to beneficiaries.
